DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR REV. 2:18-29

1. In what way, did God use Rev. 2:18-29 to convict, to encourage, to challenge, or to strengthen you?
2. While our tendency may be to see it as something uncomfortable, why should it actually be encouraging to us that Christ sees and knows all things about His Church (and everyone/everything else)?
3. What is something that you felt you needed to inform Jesus about because you were certain He must not be aware of it, since it was continuing to go on or be withheld or some other circumstance? How did it all turn out?
4. If Jesus were to affirm areas in which you have grown in His likeness, what would those areas be? (This is not a bragging on our self, but a celebration of God's grace at work in our lives).
5. If Jesus were to point out areas where growth is still needed, which ones in particular do you think He would note?
6. In what ways do you see the gospel advancing in and through Hebron and your connect group?
7. Have you ever been part of a faith family where someone was teaching some things that were in direct contradiction to the Word and the Gospel? What did you or others do to confront this situation?
8. How can a large church ensure faithful, biblical teaching is occurring in each of its groups and ministries?
9. Why is the opportunity to repent a grace to us? Why should our repentance be immediate?
10. What should we do if someone we know and care about is refusing to repent of some sin or teaching?
11. What's the best example of church discipline you've seen carried out? Why do you think church discipline is not practiced more?
12. Why should the thought of reigning/ruling with Christ in eternity always be amazing to us?
13. How can we help each other remain faithful to Christ this week?
