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DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR REVELATION 19

- 1) In what way(s), did God use His Spirit and Word in your life today as we studied Revelation 19?
- 2) Why did the heavenly multitude sing praises to God? What are some reasons that you have praised God recently?
- 3) Do you find it more difficult to praise God in the good times or difficult times? Why? How does our anticipation of Revelation 19 help us praise Him during both good times and difficult times?
- 4) When was the last time you looked forward to a meal? What do meals teach us about intimacy and relationships?
- 5) What does Revelation 19:7-8 teach us about our righteous deeds?
- 6) What does Revelation 19:10 reveal about who we worship? Why are we tempted to worship other things/people rather than worship God?
- 7) John uses a lot of Old Testament references throughout this chapter—and throughout the entire book of Revelation for that matter.
 - a. What does Revelation 19:10 teach us about the nature of God's Word?
 - b. Why is that important for us to know and consider the different allusions he is making throughout this book?
 - c. What does Luke 24:27, 44–48 and 1 Peter 1:11–12 teach us about the nature of God's Word?
- 8) Which description of Jesus in Revelation 19:11-16 sticks out to you? Why? What do these descriptions teach us about Christ?
- 9) What does Isaiah 63:1-3 teach us about Christ's garments dipped in blood?
- 10) Why is it significant that the rider on a white horse shows up before the battle? What does this image tell us about Jesus?
- 11) Why is it significant that there are no weapons wielded by the army that follows Christ? What does this teach us about Jesus?
- 12) What does Ezekiel 39:4, 17-20 teach us this "battle" recorded in Revelation 19? Why is it important to know that this battle was written about 700 years before John wrote Revelation?
