DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR PROVERBS 4

1. In what way(s), did God speak to you today through His Spirit and His Word?
2. What part of Proverbs 4 challenges you the most? Why is the writer of Proverbs repetitive in the first four chapters?
3. Where are some places that you go to gain wisdom? Do the action words (See the preaching outline) in Proverbs 4:1-9 describe your journey of gaining wisdom? Why or why not?
4. Who has imparted wisdom to you? Have you ever reached out to thank them for investing in you?
5. Why is it important to impart wisdom with love? Is it possible to impart wisdom in a way that is not loving? What does Paul state in Ephesians 4:15, 25, 29 about the issue of speaking truth in love?
6. Do you have a regular time of personal Bible reading or Bible study? Why is it important to go to the Scripture when seeking wisdom?
7. What does it look like to cherish wisdom? What are ways that you can cherish wisdom this week?
8. What are some indicators in Proverbs 4:14-17 of those that do not seek wisdom? How does this list affect your evaluation of the people that speak into your life?
9. What is the source of our sin according to Solomon (Proverbs 20:9 and Proverbs 22:25) and Jesus (Matthew 12:33-37)? (Danny Akin and Jon Akin, Christ-Centered Exposition: Exalting Jesus in Proverbs, 72)
10. What are ways that you guard your heart? The writer indicates the progression of change flows from the heart to words to eyes and finally to the feet. If we find issues with one of those areas (heart, words, eyes, or feet), why is it essential to address the beginning of the progression?
11. Proverbs 4:24 deals with the words we speak. Do your words reflect a heart changed by Christ? What would those closest to you say about your speech?
