LOVING ACCOUNTABILITY

As we partnered with God this past week to ______, what did He do? How did He work in and through us?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR 1 PETER 1:22-2:3

Read v. 22 The first "love" you see is Phileo. The second, Agape.

Phileo – a close bond of mutual affection/friendship love. This is a natural love that is based on mutual affection. For instance, a natural love that comes from liking the same things, have similar interests, we play the same sports, we like the same music.

After that is Agape, a divine, sacrificial love. It can be defined as a cost to me for the good of you. Agape love is not based on pleasant emotions or good feelings but is unconditional.

- 1. Think back to the definition of Phileo. Why is Phileo love easier for us than Agape love?
- 2. Would you say that our Connect Group/Student Ministry is defined by Phileo love or Agape? Could you work on loving those here who aren't naturally your friends or those who you don't share mutual affection with?
- 3. How can we cultivate agape love leading to Phileo love for one another?

Answer: As we consider the gospel on our own, it leads us to love like Christ who has loved us even when we were sinners. Read and consider Philippians 2:2.

- 4. Read 1 Peter 1:24-25. To what is the flesh compared? What does that mean? What is the good news of verse 25?
- 5. Read 1 Peter 2:1. These are vices that defile a heart, and we put off.
- Malice Harboring evil thoughts toward another person.
- Deceit A deliberate attempt to mislead, trick, or bait someone.
- Hypocrisy Deliberately faking or pretending you have qualities or beliefs you don't have.
- Envy not only wanting what someone has but resenting that person for having it.
- Slander to defame or speak down the reputation of those of whom we are jealous.



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- 6. In contrast, what is the opposite of each vice listed above that we should put on?
- 7. Read 1 Peter 2:2. Most of us know to read our Bible, some of us simply don't know <u>how</u> to read our Bible. What are some helpful ways to structure our Bible reading time? Discuss the pros and cons of using a devotional versus reading the Bible for yourself.
- 8. Look at 1 Peter 2:2. What is the goal of longing for the Word of God?
- 9. What are we unwilling to sacrifice in order to make time for God's Word?
- 10. God is powerful enough to give you the longing/desire that He commands you to have. Read it again. How does this truth give us hope for Bible reading?

Answer: As we consider the gospel on our own it leads us to love like Christ who has loved us even when we were sinners. Read and consider Philippians 2:2.
